

# Officials Plan Tactics to Keep Buildings Open

About 40 University, National Guard, and local law enforcement officials held a three-hour strategy meeting in city police headquarters Wednesday night to map out defense plans to keep campus classes open today.

Starting about 6 a.m., some 900 guardsmen, about 150 lawmen from adjacent counties, and close to 180 Madison and Dane County officers will take positions inside and outside campus buildings to keep doors free.

The guardsmen arrived during Wednesday night from all parts of southern Wisconsin. Surrounding county and city lawmen, who were in the campus area on call Wednesday, returned to their homes about 10:30 p.m., stayed in Madison motels, or slept in the Dane County jail.

Madison police and Dane County sheriff's men and traffic police, who had worked 14-hour shifts, were sent home about 10 p.m. with orders to report at 8 a.m. for another expected 12 hours or more duty.

The Madison and Dane County police in-service training school was canceled Wednesday, relieving about 60 men for duty to patrol regular beats.

Madison Chief Wilbur H. Emery, Sheriff Vernon (Jack) Leslie, and County Traffic Director Russell W. Klitzman said they will have "full crews" working regular police duty by assigning men to 12-hour shifts until the campus disturbances end.
