

# Seven More Arrests Put UW Total at 25

Six more University of Wisconsin men students and a co-ed were arrested Friday for resisting police on duty to keep campus and Capitol Square streets unblocked by student strikers.

Their arrests made 25 students charged since police and National Guardsmen were called to keep campus order after student demonstrators tried to disrupt a basketball game last Saturday.

Ten appeared in Criminal

Court Friday, and pleaded innocent for trials within the next month. All were released on cash bails of \$50 to \$214 on charges of disorderly conduct, street loitering, and using obscene language, except one who was jailed without bail on a charge of possessing marijuana.

**FIVE MADISON** boys, aged 15 and 16, were arrested Friday night during a student march on State St., for shooting a can of oven spray at adults in the sidewalk spectator crowd. Police said they found no one injured from the acid-type spray. The boys were taken home to parents with orders to report to Juvenile Court officials.

Police also were investigating reports that two drivers, hemmed in on State St. and University Ave. by student marchers, accelerated their cars and bumped marchers.

The only injury reported was by Wendy Rifkin, 21, of 533 W. Dayton St., a senior co-ed from Denver, Colo., who refused treatment for a bruised leg, Police Lt. Paul Klingelhofer said.
