UW Bombing *Sterling Hall* Suspect Held *Bombing 200* by Mounties

TORONTO, Ont.—Karleton Lewis Armstrong's 18-month flight has ended, Royal Canadian Mounted Police (RCMP) announced here Thursday.

Accused in the United States of murder and other crimes in connection with the Aug. 24, 1970, bombing of Sterling Hall on the University of Wisconsin-Madison campus, Armstrong, 26, was arrested late Wednesday. The Sterling Hall blast killed a 33-year-old researcher, injured three others, and caused more than \$1 million damage.

The RCMP said the arrest had not yet brought any leads on the location of three other Madison men also charged in the bombing.

THEY ARE Armstrong's brother, Dwight, 21, and former UW student Leo Burt, 25, and David Fine, 20. All four have been on the FBI's most wanted list since Sept. 4, 1970.

In Madison, Armstrong's father, Donald, 1721 Winchester St., was informed of the arrest by wire service newsmen shortly after noon Thursday.

The arrest in Karleton Armstrong's rooming house in Toronto's East End was quiet and inconspicuous.

"He did not resist in any way," Inspector George Potts of the RCMP headquarters in Ottawa said in a telephone interview.

So inconspicuous was the arrest that word did not leak out until the RCMP announced it Thursday afternoon.

"WE HAD reasons for making the announcement earlier," Potts said.

Toronto authorities, however, said the arrest was not made public immediately because they hoped one or more of the other three men sought connection with the bombing.
