

Here's Scorecard on Protest Cases

Disciplinary and court proceedings involving more than 30 University of Wisconsin students on charges growing out of recent disorders over black student demands are in progress, scheduled, or pending.

ON ANOTHER front, a Legislative investigation of the disorders which occurred from Feb. 7 through 17 and on Feb. 27 is also in progress.

A joint Senate-Assembly Committee is conducting the investigation.

Here's a rundown of the proceedings which have or will

come about as a result of the disorders:

ONE. Disciplinary proceedings against three students suspended from classes by the UW Regents for alleged destructive acts on Feb. 17 are scheduled before former State Supreme Court Justice J. Ward Rector on Mar. 31. Federal Judge James Doyle has ordered the students reinstated. Regents will act on Rector's findings.

TWO. University student disciplinary hearings against five other students are being scheduled. A date may be set today for those hearings. A University spokesman said there may be more charges filed against other students.

THREE. Thirty eight cases on arrests made in the disorders still are pending trial and hearings in Dane County Circuit and County Courts. The first trial was held in Circuit Court Wednesday. Four other cases are set to go to trial in Circuit Court later this week and next. The remainder are to be handled by the courts in the coming months.

FOUR. Doyle's order to reinstate the three suspended students is in the process of being appealed to the Federal Circuit Court of Appeals in Chicago. Atty. Gen. Robert Warren has declared he would pursue that route, but no formal action has yet been taken.

FIVE. The joint legislative committee established to probe the entire protest began its hearing Wednesday night. A second session is scheduled tonight and the full investigation is expected to last several weeks at least.
