

# Third UW Student Charged in Campus Disorders Quits

Another University of Wisconsin student facing charges growing out of last month's campus disorders here over black student demands has withdrawn from the University.

Two other UW students withdrew under charges on Tuesday. That means that former State Supreme Court Justice J. Ward Rector will have only one hearing to conduct on Monday — the case of Richard B. Rosenfeld, Olivette, O.

**HIS CASE** was one of three

that was to have been heard by Rector, but on Friday James M. Strickler of Teaneck, N.J., resigned from the University "under charges."

On Tuesday, Ronnie Stricklin, a freshman from Milwaukee, resigned under charges. The University administration had recommended expulsion of all three.

**IN OTHER** developments Friday, Law Prof. August Eckhardt announced the date of hearings for four other UW students charged in last month's

disorders. Those cases will be handled through the normal University student disciplinary procedure.

Eckhardt, chairman on the disciplinary hearing committee, said those hearings will begin on Apr. 22. He noted, however, that he has given attorneys for the four students a chance to have the hearings during spring recess (Apr. 4 to 14).

Five students originally were charged through the hearing committee channels, but one, Jeffrey C. Potkin, a sophomore from Lincolnwood, Ill., also withdrew from the University this week.

**ECKHARDT** said the hearing for Harvey Clay, a freshman from Midland, Tex., will be on Apr. 22. The hearing for Lewis Pepper, a senior from Philadelphia, will be on Apr. 24.

The hearing for Arthur R. Winnig, a Los Angeles sophomore, will be on Apr. 29, and a hearing for Peter Neufeld, a West Hempstead, N. Y., freshman, will be on May 1.

**ECKHARDT** said all four hearings will be conducted in the Law School court room and will begin at 9 a.m. He expects to be able to complete each hearing within a day, he added.

Eckhardt said he offered the students a chance to get earlier hearings because the dates agreed upon by the committee "are a bit in the future." No response on the offer of spring recess hearings has been received because the offers were just made Friday, he noted.
