

Payment of UW Reward on Bombing Tips Ends

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The University of Wisconsin has suspended the payment of the balance of the reward money in the Sterling Hall bombing.

Madison Chancellor Edwin Young recommended that no more payments be made for information leading to the arrest or conviction of persons involved in the bombing.

More than \$100,000 in cash and pledges was raised by the Board of Regents for reward money,

with \$25,000 to be paid out for each arrest and conviction.

\$12,500 Paid

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Regent Secretary Joseph Holt said \$12,500 has been paid to the informant whose tip led to the arrest of Karleton Armstrong. The balance of the \$25,000 was to be paid on Armstrong's conviction. "If this guy (the informant) comes in and asks for the rest, I don't know what stance we'll take, but he hasn't done it

yet," Holt said.

There is still \$99,000 left in the reward fund, Holt noted.

UW President John Weaver and Regent President Frank Pelisek, Milwaukee, concurred in Young's recommendation that payment of the balance of the reward money be suspended.

Other Uses Eyed

Young said persons who made pledges or donated money will be invited to make the funds availa-

ble for student assistance or services.

The \$12,500 paid out to the Armstrong informant came in the form of two cash payments in Van Hise Hall. Payment was made in the presence of an FBI agent.

Holt said the FBI told him it was sure the payment should be made.

Still wanted for their alleged part in the bombing are Armstrong's brother Dwight, and Leo Burt and David Fine.
