

# No Bombing Clues Found in Canada

The search for Karleton and Dwight Armstrong, Madison brothers, charged with last year's University of Wisconsin fatal bombing, centered Monday night on the Toronto, Canada, hippie district with no arrests, Canadian police reported.

Sheriff Vernon (Jack) Leslie and Madison Detective Charles Lulling, working with Toronto and Royal Canadian Mounted Police (RCMP), said the search will continue in the area where the Armstrongs were believed living two weeks ago.

Toronto police said the district has about 35,000 United States young residents, plus "communal" Canadian youths, who live for less than \$20 a week — including rent — in houses sometimes occupied by 50 to 100 residents.

"Anybody could hide out here," Leslie said. "We've been looking at every face with no answers."

The Madison officers praised the RCMP and Toronto metropolitan police. They said the Canadian officers believe that David Fine and Leo Burt, two former UW students wanted with the Armstrongs for the Aug. 24, 1970, bombing of Sterling Hall, still may be in Canada.

All four suspects, on the FBI most wanted list and with a \$100,000 reward for their arrest offered by the UW, have concealed their whereabouts for a year, since the Armstrongs were seen with a stolen car in New York and Burt and Fine were reported in Canada. Leslie said he and Lulling plan to confer with RCMP officials at their headquarters in Ottawa.
