

Sterling Reward Note *Hall* Spurs Hunt *for* for Suspects *2 one*

The Royal Canadian Mounted Police (RCMP) issued new wanted notices from Ottawa headquarters Wednesday, reminding Canadians that the University of Wisconsin has a \$100,000 reward for the arrest and conviction of four suspects in the Aug. 24, 1970, Sterling Hall bombing.

RCMP Inspector George Potts said the new notices were dispatched to all provinces after Sheriff Vernon (Jack) Leslie and Detective Charles Lulling provided Dane County murder warrants in Ottawa on which the suspects could be extradited to Madison for trial if they are located in Canada.

"THERE IS no change or developments in our investigation, but we have released these new wanted notices to reemphasize that your people still have \$100,000 in reward money and new murder warrants. Maybe we will get results," Potts said Wednesday night.

The fugitives are Madison brothers, Karleton, 25, and Dwight Armstrong, 20, and two former UW students from Pennsylvania and Delaware, Leo Burt, 23, and David Fine, 20.

LESLIE AND Lulling went to Canada to investigate a report that the Armstrongs had been living in a hippie district in Toronto. They reported finding evidence of where they had lived,

but the brothers were not found.

The last verified sighting of Fine and Burt was Sept. 3, 1970, when they escaped RCMP surveillance at a Peterborough, Ont., youth hostel.

Leslie and Lulling were reported en route to check with authorities in Montreal today.

The \$100,000 reward is awaiting collection at UW Trust Officer Joseph S. Holt's office.

The fund was supplied by contributions from \$1 to \$10,000 from individuals and business firms throughout the U.S.
