

# Canada Issues Warrants for 4 Bombing Suspects

Canadian arrests warrants were issued Friday for four suspects hunted for 13 months for the Aug. 24, 1970, bombing of the University of Wisconsin Sterling Hall. Madison Detective Charles Lulling was notified by Royal Canadian Mounted Police in Toronto.

The Canadian warrants, arranged through legal contacts supplied two weeks ago by Lulling and Sheriff Vernon (Jack) Leslie investigating a report of the suspects in a 35,000-populated Toronto hippie district, were necessary for immediate arrests if the suspects are spotted by Canadian officers, Lulling said.

Lulling said the Canadian police told him Friday they had no new leads to the whereabouts of the suspects, Madison brothers, Karleton and Dwight Armstrong, and Leo Burt and David Fine.

Under Canadian law concerning fugitive suspects from other nations, Canadian police needed their own arrest warrants to execute the wanted notices issued on charges from Dane County and U.S. Federal Courts, Lulling said.

Toronto police said the Canadian warrants charge the four, as in Dane County warrants, with first degree murder of a research physicist, Robert Fassnacht; conduct regardless of life and endangering life of four other building occupants injured in the blast; arson by explosives; conspiracy to commit arson, and illegal possession of explosives.
