

# Suspect Search Shifts to Northwest Ontario

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The manhunt for Leo Burt, 22, and David Fine, 18 — two suspects in the Aug. 24 University of Wisconsin bombing, apparently has shifted to northwestern Ontario.

The Peterborough Examiner said Monday night that Peterborough police believe the pair has headed north to Haliburton County and possibly northwest along the southern Ontario border to Thunder Bay County.

**THUNDER BAY** County is on the northern border of Lake Superior and about 160 miles northwest of Superior, Wis.

The two suspects reportedly stayed at YMCA transient center in Peterborough from Sunday to Wednesday of last week. Peterborough is a city of 55,000 about 50 miles east of Toronto.

Peterborough police knew of the pair's whereabouts but

didn't detain them because, they said, Wisconsin had failed to issue a warrant which would have allowed them to make the arrest.

Canadian officials issued alien warrants Friday night which allows authorities to hold the fugitives without Wisconsin charges.

Since the fugitives were placed in Peterborough, police have been bombarded with hundreds of calls from people

who think they've sighted the pair.

**POLICE SAID** Monday two cars which were stolen while the pair was in the area have not been recovered. They suspect Burt and Fine in the thefts. No descriptions of the cars have been released.

Chief of Police Jack Shrubbs said he would explain at a news conference this morning how he knew the pair was in the area and why they got away after the warrants were issued.

Dane County Dist. Atty. James C. Boll said Sunday he had no plans to file charges in the bombing because the Canadian warrants could assure deportation of the suspects to this country.

The FBI has issued warrants charging the four suspects with conspiracy, sabotage, and destruction of government property. The other suspects, Karleton Armstrong, 22, and his brother, Dwight, 19, were last seen Thursday in Little Falls, N.Y.

**AN EARLY** morning bomb threat at the University Primate Lab and Research Center 1223 Capitol Court, cleared the building and the neighborhood, but a search failed to find any explosives. The threat was phoned to the Madison police switchboard at 2:40 a.m. Police blocked roads until 5 a.m.

The \$6 million blast that tore through the UW Army Mathematics Research Center on Aug. 24 killed a physics researcher, Robert Fassnacht, 33.

The four suspects were added to the FBI's 10 Most-Wanted list Friday. The FBI also wants to question the suspects about an attempted bombing at the Badger Army Ordnance Plant near Baraboo Jan. 1.

**SAUK COUNTY** Sheriff Ralph Hearn has charged Karleton Armstrong with possession of explosives concerning a February attempt to bomb a power utility substation near the ammunition plant.

Materials believed to have been used in the construction of the math center bomb were discovered by FBI agents near Sauk City Saturday. Hearn said Sunday that a white granular substance believed to be nitrate fertilizer and a 55-gallon steel drum containing traces of fuel oil were found in a wooded area about 25 miles from Madison.

The FBI has filed a court affidavit quoting an employe of a Baraboo farmers' cooperative as saying he sold 1,700 pounds of fertilizer Aug. 19 to a customer matching Armstrong's description.
